Goals and Objectives for 2000-2001

2000-2001 District Governor Bob Lovely sets goals for Service and Fellowship Through Rotary

Service and Fellowship Through Rotary is the theme I have established for our District for the 2000/2001 Rotary year. The theme was created to help us focus on what is good about Rotary and to help us set goals that can facilitate both Service and Fellowship. I believe that many people join Rotary for fellowship. And indeed, not many of us would stay in Rotary if we did not enjoy a certain amount of fellowship for our efforts. Providing service is a good goal in and of itself. However, when we do service we also create fellowship. In my book, that's a real win-win situation.

But if we are to provide service and create fellowship, we must analyze what it takes to achieve this on a continuing basis. Rotary Club leadership is not rocket science—leadership means effectively planned meetings which are designed to be fun and of interest to the members, projects that do good and allow the members to feel good about themselves, fund raisers that provide value to the consumer and fit the comfort level of the club members and enough growth in membership to sustain vitality that comes from new ideas.

I've reviewed many of the goals and objectives prepared by you or your peers for the coming year. They focus on the criteria for leadership I mentioned above.

I'd like to refresh you on the District's goals for 2000-2001. These are based on feedback from our District 5020 President-Elects, input from the District Advisory Council, input from Rotary International and the District Governor's evaluation of District needs.

District Vision

The vision for our district is to engage all clubs in improving services and fellowship activities, both locally and internationally. Rotarians should feel that their personal and business needs are furthered by being members of Rotary. Each club should strive for vitality, with all members participating in club projects. As a result, membership will grow, and Rotary will be known and respected by our communities.

District Mission Statement

The district organization will assist each club to the extent it requires. We will grow Rotary so as to allow others the opportunity to participate and for Rotary to be able to better serve.

District Goals

- Have 75% of clubs receive the Presidential Citation by April 1, 2001
- Raise a minimum of \$400,000 in cash for Rotary Foundation Annual Fund activities/programs by May 17, 2001.
- Have 20% of all members signed up as Rotary Foundation Permanent Fund Benefactors (10% by January 30 and 20% by May 17, 2001).
- Have a total net gain of 380 members with at least 5 members per club.
- Have an upgraded website up and running by July 1, 2000 that will facilitate communications between all clubs, facilitate district activities and enhance our public relations efforts.

District Objectives

- Have leadership well trained by holding District and Area Leadership Training Assemblies.
- Have a backlog of Rotarians desiring to serve at the district level.
- Inspire every Rotarian to understand and support their club's goals and those of Rotary International and the Rotary Foundation.

Let us *Create Awareness* of needs and opportunities. Let us *Take Action* toward achieving these goals.

You've heard the saying "If you don't know where you are going, any road will take you there." An old cliché but very apt when it comes to getting things done.

When you have prepared plans and set goals and objectives for your club for the coming year, I suggest that you make a point of going back and reviewing these goals every month to see what is on track and what needs to have some more attention.

As you go about working on your projects and running your clubs, please keep in mind that the District is an available resource to help you. *The District's sole purpose is to provide support to you and RI in achieving objects of Rotary.* While your first point of contact with the District is normally with your Assistant Governor, please feel free to contact me directly if you like. I plan on being available to help out at club functions, fund raisers and projects. If my calendar is free for a date when I get a request, I'll be there.

The District provides several other resources that may be of help to you this coming year. They are:

District Directory & Resource Guide

The Directory is an 86 page document with helpful information. It was printed in June and will be delivered to your clubs by your Assistant Governor. Please take time to review the entire guide so as to be able to make best use of it.

The R.I. 5020 District Website (www.rotary5020.org)

The website is under construction and will be available about August 1, 2000. It will incorporate much of the District Directory. It will include information on each of the Avenue of Service Committees and significant District meetings.

With the future in mind, we need to sponsor, team with, and support service learning programs in our schools and Interact and Rotaract Clubs for youth and young adults.

As the editor of Governor Lovely's newsletter and chairman of the Club Service Committee, I invite you to join Bob and your district's leadership team in making this year "Rotary's best year yet." We need to again become a TEAM (Together Everyone Achieves More) for 2000-01 and the 21st Century. We need to be active members of the Rotary International Team, the District 5020 Team, and our local club team.

Permanent Fund News from the Western USA's Zone 23 from 1999-2000

We have exciting news!

On the local giving front, the Permanent Fund received a gift from the mother of an Oregon Rotarian in the amount of \$100,000. As a result, District 5110 PF gifts for the 1999-2000 year were \$123,000. District 5030 was second at \$120,000. They are followed by our District 5020 with \$2,000, and District 5080 with \$1,700 and District 5100 at \$1,000 each. The Permanent fund needs more major gifts! Please make this a club goal for 2000-2001.

District 5020 led Zone 23 with \$200,000 in "Restricted Giving." Zone 23 was the seventh highest zone in the world for total giving and annual fund giving.

Internationally, The Rotary Foundation will be soliciting funds to pay for a new Rotary Centers Program. There are several opportunities for individuals and districts. For individuals, they may endow a scholar at a donation level of \$500,000, or make any other donation they wish. The Foundation is also seeking funding for adjunct programs, such as support for the schools involved and summer study programs. Districts have the opportunity to fund the first wave of scholars by making a \$50,000 donation from their DDF (\$25,000 for two years). Such districts will be recognized as "Pioneer Districts." Districts may also donate lesser amounts to help the program if they desire through the annual SHARE designations.

Polio Plus will be a major goal area for Rotary and the World as we enter the 21st Century. On April 28, President Carlo Ravizza and TRF Chair Bill Huntley signed an agreement with the United Nations Foundation in which the UNF committed itself to help raise the final \$200,000,000 we need to complete the Polio Plus effort. UNF will spend \$6,000,000 to hire staff, and create and manage a fund raising campaign to raise the \$200 million. The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and Ted Turner have each pledged \$25,000,000 to the campaign.

News from Rotary International

July is Literacy Month



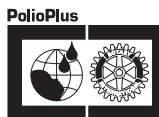
While the social and economic damage caused by illiteracy poses a year-round challenge, the R.I. Board encourages clubs and districts to pay special attention to the problem in **JULY**, designated as **LITERACY MONTH**.

July provides a great opportunity to organize volunteers to read to children at a local pre-school, tutor at an adult literacy program, or collect books to send to an impoverished school in a developing nation. A useful club resource is *Rotary Promotes Literacy* (Pub. No. 601), which provides an overview of the issues surrounding illiteracy, offers project ideas, cites examples of successful club projects and includes a list of resource organizations. A boost for polio eradication

Two US philanthropic organizations joined the drive to rid the world of polio by the end of this year. The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, established by the family of Microsoft Corporation founder Bill Gates, and the United Nations Foundation, set up by media magnate Ted Turner, respectively donated US\$50 million and US\$28 million. Gates and Turner challenged public and private sectors to match their donations, which will be primarily used to strengthen the vaccine delivery infrastructure in some of the world's poorest countries and track remaining pockets of the disease.

PolioPlus, Rotary International's pioneering effort to eradicate polio, is recognized worldwide as the best practice for health-care initiatives in developing countries. It is made possible through private and public partnerships. Collaborating with WHO, the United Nations Children's Fund and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Rotary hopes to rid the world of polio by the year 2005.

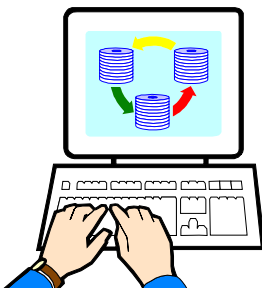

Group Study Exchange in 2001 will send and receive visitors from Rotary Districts in Finland and Brazil

GSE Exchanges for the coming year are with **District 1400 in Finland (May 14 - June 9, 2001)** and **District 4440 in Brazil (May 26 - June 26, 2001)**. Rotarians interested in being Team Leaders should apply to their club's president now, and clubs should advertise in the local newspapers now for applicants in order to screen and nominate candidates by the August deadline.

The Group Study Exchange program of the Rotary Foundation promotes international understanding through organized travel, vocational training, and personal contact. The program provides travel grants for teams of young professional men and women between 25-40 to exchange visits between paired areas in different countries. For 4-5 weeks, team members study the host country's institutions and ways of life, observe their own professions as practiced abroad, develop personal and professional relationships, and exchange ideas. The GSE team consists of five non-Rotarian business or professional men and women between the ages of 25-40, and a Rotarian team leader.

Applicants must:

- be committed to remaining in the work force well after the exchange;
- be in the early stages of their careers or professions;
- reside in or be employed in District 5020 and also be citizens of the country in which they reside;
- be proficient in the language of the country being visited;
- be personable, articulate, cooperative, exemplary in their work, and enthusiastic about their vocations; and
- seek to gain a maximum educational value from the program, as well as be able to fulfill the rigorous and active participation in an extensive itinerary.

Polio Campaign Tops \$36,000.00

A donation of \$10,000.00, proceeds from the Comox Valley Insurance (CVI) Group Charity Golf Tournament, boosted the total raised by Valley Rotarians to more than \$36,000.00 in their campaign to help eradicate polio from the world by the end of this year. The golf tournament, an annual event sponsored by CVI, was a tremendous event that included 90 golfers representing all facets of the insurance industry including clients. One hundred thirty attended the gala dinner following the tournament at Crown Isle last week.

Rotarian John Hackett, chair of the tri-club campaign committee, was presented a cheque for \$10,000.00 by Fred Bossom and Audrey Craig, representing the insurance community. Hackett thanked the golfers and the insurance industry for their generosity and the whole Comox Valley for the support that was given to this important fundraiser. The total raised, with matching grants from Rotary District 5020, the Rotary Foundation of Rotary International and the Rotary Committee of the Canadian International Development Agency, will make more than \$180,000.00 available to assist in the fight to eradicate polio from the world for good. Polio will soon join smallpox as the second disease to be eradicated by mankind.

Comox Interact funds Zimbabwe

Comox Rotarians recently received a cheque for \$250.00 to be used in support of the Rotary-sponsored project to help children in Zimbabwe. The donation came from the Interact Club at Highland Secondary School, which is sponsored by the Rotary Club of Strathcona Sunrise.

When the Interactors heard about the project, spearheaded by Doug Ante, Comox Rotarian and Past AG for Area 1, to assist children in Zimbabwe with their education, the club launched a fundraiser within the Highland student population to raise some money. In Zimbabwe, state-supported education ends at the end of

the seventh year and further education is only possible if the students can pay for their tuition and other requirements. The cost per student per year is the equivalent of \$50.00 Canadian, a small amount in our country but more than most rural families in Zimbabwe can afford.

A Rotary day with Snowbirds

With the cooperation of the Commander of 19 Wing-Comox, Colonel Bill Neumann, the Commanding Officer of the Snowbirds, Major Bob Painchaud, and Dr. Terry James of School District 71, the Strathcona Sunrise Rotary Club made it possible for 76 grade five students to attend the last airshow practice performed by the Snowbirds before they returned to Moose Jaw.

The visitors were transported to a terrific viewing site where they were welcomed by the Snowbirds' commentators and treated to lunch provided by the Rotarians.

The Snowbirds once again demonstrated that they are a credit to the Air Force, their country and themselves.

Adventures in Music

In addition to providing financial support to Courtenay Youth Music Centre for their bursary program, the Comox Valley's three Rotary clubs launched an additional support program this year called "Adventures in Music."

Here's how it works. Rotary clubs in Canada and Washington State were invited to sponsor worthy music students to attend CYMC's summer program during the month of July. For their part, the 3 Valley clubs agreed to provide accommodations in the homes of Valley Rotarians for the "Adventures in Music" students. In this the first year of the Adventures program, 26 students from as far away as Ontario have been sponsored by Rotary clubs in their communities. Allan Webster of the Sunrise Rotary club and Liz Dattoo of CYMC have been delighted by

the response and underscored the importance of bringing a diverse collection of musical talents to our Valley to learn and make music together with youth from our community.

CYMC has been a part of our community since 1967 and has seen some 10,000 young people participate in its programs. Rising Canadian jazz singer Diana Krall is an alumnus of CYMC. Valley Rotarians are pleased that they have developed a partnership with CYMC and, through other Rotary network clubs been able to provide opportunities for young local and international students of music to enjoy the CYMC summer programs.

Sunrisers Install Bob McQuillan

At a dinner held at the Officers' Mess on 5 July, Bob McQuillan was installed as the Strathcona Sunrisers' fourteenth president, succeeding Linda McLean.

In her final report to the club, McLean pointed with pride to the many projects and activities of the club during the past year in particular the considerable work completed in the first phase of the development of the Simms Millennium Park. McLean thanked the members of her executive, Board of Directors and all Rotarians for their tireless dedication to Rotary's motto of 'Service Above Self.' In recognition of McLean's service to mankind and spirited leadership of the club, Marty Douglas, on behalf of all members, presented her with a Paul Harris Fellowship, her second.
