January is Rotary Awareness Month!

As we begin the New Year, let us be grateful for all we have, grateful to be living where we live, and thankful we have the means and ability to help those less fortunate.

As Marnee and I traveled throughout the District these past six months and had the opportunity to see the impact your clubs have made in your communities and, indeed, in the world, we are grateful, thankful, and proud to be a part of Rotary and District 5020!

Rotary's ability to help so many in need around the world is through The Rotary Foundation. If you have not yet made your donation now is the time to do it. When donations are made to The Rotary Foundation the monies are invested for three years, the interest is used to run RI and half of the amount comes back to our district. In the past most of the funds were disbursed by the Rotary Foundation, with only a small portion coming to the district for disbursement as District Simplified Grants. July 1, 2010, District 5020 will, along with 99 other Rotary Districts around the world, begin the Future Vision Pilot Program. The Future Vision Pilot Program allows more money to come directly to the district giving us more control over how the funds are spent. In order for the process to continue its imperative Rotarians continue to support The Rotary Foundation.

During our visits, Marnee and I observed several clubs are making donating to The Rotary Foundation relatively painless to insure every Rotarian participates. The \$2.00 a week program! The Rotary Club of Sequim Sunrise and the Rotary Club of Parksville AM are just two of the clubs using this system. Qualicum Beach Sunrise sells Rotary Dollars! The money members spend to buy Rotary Dollars goes to TRF in their name and Rotary Dollars are used at meetings to pay fines or use for Happy or Sad Bucks! Another idea is to set up an automatic monthly withdrawal from the Rotarians checking or savings account or to automatically charge to their credit card.

Rotary is such a wonderful organization we really need to share it! Each of us can do this by making sure everyone you know is aware of

Madeleine gave her presentation of her vision of the future at the United Nations World Conference on Climate Change. The jury consisted of representatives of the business and academic world and the contest was sponsored by Boeing.

Getting Back To Basics: A Plan for Membership Development

Getting to Know — and be Known by, — Your Community

The community is the primary source of a club's membership and the principal source of its fund raising. Clubs should get to know their community: the governing body, including its structure, methods of functioning, vision and goals; the demographics; the types of businesses and their products or services; other charitable and community service organizations and what they provide; available facilities and resources; climate and geography; and social functions such as annual celebrations and inaugural events.

Within the community, it is also very useful to know how to get things done, who to approach for particular needs and supplies, and how best to advertise and announce. The community may have special needs, problems and issues which could be addressed by a club project. Clubs can identify an area, or areas, on which to focus its local service initiatives. In providing those services, the Club will be seen as a vital and well known part of the community, and it will be sought out when the need arises for those services. Raising funds locally for international service projects becomes easier if the projects involve the same area of focus as local projects. They also further enhance the Club's reputation and identity. Clubs can develop a theme. An example from one club is: "Helping children locally and internationally."

As the club gets to know its community, the community will get to know its Rotary Club. Clubs can benefit from an active Public Relations program. A dynamic relationship between the Directors of Membership and Public Relations, and their respective Committees is seen as of utmost importance.

Here are some ways to engage with your community:

- *Each Rotarian must recognize themselves as an ambassador of both the local Rotary Club and RI. To a greater or lesser degree, each Club will be known within the community, through and by each of its members.*
- *Addresses to the Club can be requested from members of: local businesses; the Chamber of Commerce, or other business organizations; other service clubs; religious and charitable groups; other community organizations; the Municipal Council; municipal service organizations such as police, fire, schools, and health care; members of the community who have undertaken notable endeavors; and others which the Club sees as enhancing its knowledge of the community.*
- *Members of the Club can offer to address other community organizations.*
- *The Club can put on local functions such as dances, BBQs, and other celebrations to which the community at large is invited.*
- *Presentations of official Rotary Awards, such as Paul Harris Fellowships, or locally initiated, "unofficial" awards, for example, those for "Vocational Service", "Business of the Year", and "Community Service", can be made, at annual or other public ceremonies, to members of the community who exemplify the attributes of Rotary.*
- *Establish a Youth Recognition Program in the Community, including components such as Student of the Month and/or Year Award, and Student Employee of the Year.*
- *The Club can have a presence at community functions such as markets, fairs, parades, and other types of community celebrations.*
- *The Club can establish formal and informal relationships with other community organizations and individuals. Offer to work at their fundraising events in exchange for them working at yours.*

SUMNER PROVIDES STUDENT DICTIONARIES— In 2007, the Rotary Club of Sumner began a literacy campaign to provide dictionaries for every third grader in the nine elementary schools in the Sumner and Dieringer School Districts. In their first year they presented 736 dictionaries and in their second year – 737. This year, during the month of November, 31 members from the Sumner Rotary Club delivered a whopping 801 dictionaries to local delighted, fresh-faced, eager-to-learn third grade students in all nine elementary schools. They also playfully administered a very serious “Oath of a Dictionary Owner” in which the students happily swore to “use their dictionaries every day to become a very good reader, a very good writer, and a life-long learner forever and ever.” A dictionary is perhaps the first and most powerful reference tool a child should own. Its usefulness goes beyond the spellings, pronunciations, and definitions it lists. It is a companion for solving problems that arise as a child develops his or her reading, writing, and creative thinking abilities. Students benefit from an increased self-reliance and resourcefulness inspired by the maxim “look it up”.

The Giving Tree -- A tradition at the Tri City Rotary Club's Christmas Party is to collect funds to help those who are needy in their community. The recipients are selected by several club members working very closely with trusted educators to identify worthy and needy families with children. The horrendous floods of recent years not only affected the hard hit Chehalis-Centralia area and west, but a number of communities



in the eastern part of our county, 40-60 miles away. The annual party was held on December 4th and after viewing a slide presentation of the flood damage supplied by our County Sheriff, the 70 attendees contributed \$8,400 to the tree, the most in the history of the Club. This amount does include some previously budgeted money and a community grant from our local WalMart. This annual holiday giving is one way that the Twin Cities Rotary lives the spirit of Rotary. The club also received a District Grant of \$2500, which was distributed immediately to the families.

Be sure to remove your address label and replace it with a label indicating your club name, where and when you meet, (shared by the Rotary Club of Cumberland Centennial). Carry "What is Rotary" cards with you to have ready to pass out to interested people; hang The 4-Way Test" prominently in our offices. Letting your customers and clients know you hold yourself personally and professionally to the highest standards of honesty, integrity and character can only be a bonus for you!
